At Cal Poly Humboldt, we are moving toward achieving zero waste.

That means lowering our total campus waste footprint altogether, and working to reach a level of zero material sent to the landfill. We do this by preventing anything that cannot be reused or upcycled from entering campus in the first place, AND by diverting materials when possible to a viable and valuable recycling or composting stream.

We also banned single-use plastic water bottles on campus in 2014 and we use a program called OZZI for reusable to-go containers at Dining. Join the movement to reusable and zero waste!

FOLLOW THE ZERO WASTE HIERARCHY

ROSE: Visit the Reusable Office Supply Exchange (ROSE) to drop off or get free office supplies. Contact WRRAP for info wrrap@humboldt.edu

Recycle: Sort paper, cardboard, aluminum, glass, and plastics #1-5 into recycling bins

Compost: Sort all food scraps and food soiled paper into compost bins

Other required recycling: Collect batteries, CFL's, CDs, electronics and return them to Universal waste bins on campus

See this little piece? This represents any material that can't be prevented or diverted from the landfill. We're looking to eliminate this part altogether!







SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORTATION

We are also working hard to eliminate single-occupant vehicle commutes in order to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Check out our many sustainable transportation programs, that make it quick and easy to get around the area without a car: use our low cost bike share program, get your bike repaired for free through the Bicycle Learning Center (and access tools), take the bus by swiping your student ID card, find a carpool partner with RideShare, grab a Zipcar when you need it (so you can leave your car back home), walk, and more!

ENERGY & WATER

Campus is charged with reducing energy and water use by the state and CSU system. There are a multitude of ways campus users can participate in conserving these precious resources:

Turn off lights when daylight is available or when leaving a room. Put computers and A/V equipment into sleep mode or turn off entirely when not in use. Close doors & windows when heating and cooling systems are on. Wash clothes in cold water. Limit shower times to five minutes or less. Turn off the tap when lathering hands. Report water leaks to Facilities Management.







LANDSCAPE

The campus makes a concerted effort to minimize the application of inorganic additives to the degree possible by prioritizing organic fertilizers and pest treatment.

Furthermore, campus acts as a living laboratory for classes and individuals to learn and explore the natural world around them. Plant taxonomy classes, ecology classes, ethnobotany classes and classes in many other areas of study regularly access the University's diverse and noteworthy collection of plant species from all over the world. SELECTED HIGHLIGHTS

Bicycle Learning Center

Students can bring their bikes to the <u>Bicycle Learning Center</u> to access nocost bicycle maintenance help, including parts, tools, and instruction from fellow students. The BLC educates and advocates for the safe use of bicycles as an affordable, healthful and sustainable form of transportation and recreation and strives to empower a community of bicyclists to feel confident cycling.

R.O.S.E. HOUSE

R.O.S.E. is an on-campus source for free office and school supplies available to the campus community. It is run by students of the Waste Reduction Resources Awareness Program and is located in Nelson Hall West room 216. During the Fall 2019 semester, students saved over \$11,000 by getting materials from ROSE and diverted approximately 1,528 pounds of waste from the landfill.
